

An Inspirational Story

"The Mail and Guardian" recently published an article on the role of scouting in the war-ravaged Central African Republic (CAR). The article notes that there are more scouts than peace keepers in the CAR and said the following about the achievements of scouting in that country:

"He and his peers rattle off a list of accomplishments that makes it clear that the scout movement in this country is not just a recreational activity.

Some representative examples: when UNICEF, the UN Children's Fund, wanted to roll out a nationwide vaccination programme, it was the boy scouts who knocked on village doors to tell sceptical citizens that the doctors were coming and that they could be trusted. When nervous villagers need to go to hospital in a distant town, they can request a scout to accompany them along unfamiliar roads and territory.

When a Muslim community was trapped in the forest near Boda, in 2017, it was the scouts who mediated with the armed groups holding them hostage to secure their release. When the Pope came to visit in 2015, it was the scouts who managed the delirious crowds that lined his route from the airport.

And, this year, when humanitarian aid workers received those jumbled reports about a potential Ebola outbreak in a remote, treacherous part of the country, it was the scouts who were consulted as the first line of inquiry. Scouts were already there, of course. Fortunately for all concerned, there was no sign of the deadly virus."

The CAR is divided along ethnic and religious lines. Scouting is one of the few organisations that cut across these divides, as shown by this picture of two scout leaders, one Catholic, the other Muslim.

Remembrance Day 2018

Every year on 11 November people from around the world pause to think about the futility of war and the sacrifices of those who were killed in war. You will probably notice many people also wear a red poppy during this time as a sign of respect.

This year is a particularly important year as it marks 100 years since the end of World War I. Is your patrol doing anything to take a stand against war and to remember its victims?



Why not attend one of the two public functions to commemorate remembrance day?

The first is run by the Mayor of Johannesburg at the Cenotaph in the CBD and includes a marchpast by troops and members of the civil defence units in the early afternoon. There are traditionally several troops present from

Southern District so your patrol will not be alone.

The second is the "Shadow March" which takes place at sunset (normally at the War Memorial next to the zoo). This is run by the MOTHS (a veterans' association) who recall their lost comrades when they see the long shadows cast on the ground by the setting sun.

If a patrol attends either function it will count as a patrol meeting for the purposes of star patrol certificates and each patrol attending will get 50 points towards the yearend trophy.

Group AGM

The Group AGM has been moved from 2 November 2018 to 23 November 2018 at 19h00. The AGM will kick off with a prize giving and a group photograph, so please ensure that you are in proper uniform.

The prize giving should not take more than 20 minutes and the AGM itself is seldom more than 40 minutes long. Please note that the fees for the new year will be set at the AGM. I would ask that each family send along at least one representative.

Year End Camp

Traditionally the year-end camp is held before 16 December when many families leave for holiday. The difficulty with this is that government school holidays are only due to start on 13 December 2018, making it very difficult to fit in a full-sized year end camp that accommodates our government school members. Private school holidays are due to start on 7 December 2018.

A number of scouts have indicated that, notwithstanding the "official" close of school, they will have finished exams long before 13 December and will be able to attend a camp before 13 December. In addition, the 16^{th} is a Sunday, which means that many families will be looking at going on holiday from the evening of Friday 14 December.

For these reasons I would like to see if our provisional dates of 13 to 17 December are still the best dates for the majority of scouts.

In order to enable us to plan a decent year-end camp that accommodates as many scouts as possible, it would be appreciated if scouts would complete the reply form at

the end of this newsletter and to return it by no later than Wednesday 7 November 2018 (I know this is not much time, but extensive planning still needs to take place).

For the new members of the troop, the year end camp is an extended camp traditionally held early in the December holidays. This is a fantastic opportunity for advancement but it normally includes a whole range of fun activities. In years past activities have included hiking, cycling, game drives, marksmanship, canoeing, visits to battlefields and the Sudwala caves, kloofing and abseiling. The activities will obviously depend on the venue of the camp, which will in turn depend on how long the camp is and the budget for the camp. Venues in years past have included the Natal Drakensberg, the Transvaal Drakensberg, the Magaliesberg and the Vaal River.

The budget is normally all inclusive (transport, accommodation and food for the duration of the camp) and the camp is normally open to potential recruits to the troop (boys between the ages of 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ and 17 $\frac{1}{2}$). The camp is normally 4 -5 days long and the budget would be for a camp of that duration.

One of the major costs is the cost of using the venue. If you would like to suggest a venue (which ideally should be close to some decent hiking as most scouts need to do a hike for advancement) please note this on the reply slip.
