I would like to firstly wish everyone a happy and prosperous 2019. I trust that everyone had a restful break and is ready for 2019.


As always, the troop has been incredibly busy since the last newsletter and has also received a number of accolades.

Firstly, congratulations must be extended to Kyle Botes on accomplishing his Springbok Scout Award. Less than 1% of scouts achieve this milestone and it took much blood, sweat and tears on the part of Kyle to complete his Springbok. Kyle's Springbok means that the troop has produced two Springboks in less than a year. This would not be possible without the constant support of members of the troop and I would like to thank all of you for making this possible.

Both Kyle and Michael Omand were presented their Springbok Certificates by Andrew Tanner, the Chief Scout's Commissioner at the Springbok Award Parade at Gilwell in February. Only 18 Springbok Scouts were produced in Gauteng over the past year, meaning that this troop was responsible for 11,11% of all Springboks produced in the Gauteng Region over the period, despite there being well over 100 troops in the Region.

At BP Sunday on 24 February the troop received the Jack Barford Trophy for the best troop in the Northrand Scout District. Again this is testament to the hard work of each and every scout in the troop and I would like to encourage you to keep up the hard work. Well done!

In addition to this, the troop was the only troop in the district to receive a Star Troop Award (the troop obtained bronze) and one our patrols, Kudu Patrol, was one of only two patrols in the entire Gauteng Region to receive a gold star patrol award. The other three patrols received participation awards. Well done to all the scouts!

Our scouts have been very busy on the badge front since our last newsletter.

On the Advancement Badge side, Dylan Odgers and Dean Stones earned their Pathfinder Badges, Simon Kleer, Michael Goncalves and Jarod Nunn earned their Adventurer Badges and Kyle Botes earned his Explorer Badge in addition to his Springbok.

In terms of interest badges, James Bartlett earned his Scoutcraft Survival Badge, Michael Westhoff earned his Handyman Badge, Gordon Grossett earned his Food for Life (Silver) Badge, Kyle Botes achieved his Hiking Scoutcraft Badge, Guide Badge

and Mapping Badge. More recently Alexio Adriao, Ethan Kodisang-Londt, Ethan Patterson and Bradley Stones all achieved their Swimming Scoutcraft Badges and several scouts are on the cusp of earning their Swimmer and Lifesaver Badges. Well done!

We also had three scouts, Jarod Nunn, Simon Kleer and Michael Goncalves attend the recent Gilten PLTU course and trust that they will pass on their hard-earned knowledge to their patrols. The course is in my opinion the premier leadership course in the country for youth and I am sure that all three candidates did us proud.

Entsha Programme

In order to ensure that scouts remains relevant in the modern age a review of the advancement programme has taken place and the new Entsha Programme is in the process of being phased in. All scouts need to have moved from the old programme onto the Entsha Programme by 30 June 2019.

At 1st Bedfordview each scout will be able to decide for themselves when they want to move onto the Entsha Programme, provided that all scouts will be moved onto the programme by 30 June 2019 and provided that all new members of the troop will start on the Entsha Programme. The guiding principle is that no scout should be prejudiced by the move to Entsha and if a scout wants to finish off an advancement badge on the old programme he may do so, provided that such badge is completed by 30 June 2019.

Scouts Digital can only handle one programme at a time, so until the entire troop moves onto Entsha only those scouts on the old programme will be able to view their progress online. Manual records will be maintained for scouts on Entsha. Once the entire troop has moved onto Entsha, all scouts will be able to view their progress online. All scouts will be able to view their interest badge progress and challenge award online irrespective of which programme they are on.

Kontiki

Kontiki is just around the corner and will be taking place from 17 to 19 May 2019 at Arrowe Park, Benoni. This is one of the highlights on the scouting calendar and is not to be missed.

This year we are expecting to be invaded by hundreds and hundreds of little yellow Minions, so make sure you are in the Gru-ve and ready for anything. For more information on the actual event you can visit http://kontiki.scouts.co.za/.



It would be appreciated if all scouts could complete the reply slip at the end of this newsletter so we can get a feel for who is interested in attending Kontiki. The cost of attending the camp will depend on the number of scouts attending but is estimated to be in the region of R300,00 per person, including food and camping fees.

If you do not want to attend the camp you can visit as a day visitor at a cost of R50,00, which includes a badge. If you attend as a day visitor, no meals will be catered for you and your parents will be responsible for getting you to and from



Kontiki. You will not be able to be eligible for the raft and will not be able to camp at Kontiki.

Space on the raft is limited and will be allocated in the discretion of the Court of Honour. The amount of effort you put into the various prep functions leading up to Kontiki is very important in determining if you will get a spot on the raft.

Scouts who want to be on the raft MUST hold the Swimming Scoutcraft Badge and MUST be available for the entire weekend.

Friends of scout-going age with a genuine interest in possibly joining the troop are welcome to join us for the weekend, provided they are prepared to follow the Scout Promise and Law.

First Aid Course

As part of the new Entsha Programme scouts wanting to obtain their Springbok Scout Awards will have to complete both their Scoutcraft First Aid Badge and their First Aid Interest Badge.

Lee Bartlett has very kindly obtained details for a first aid course to be run from 18 to 20 March 2019 at Jeppe High School for Boys at a cost of R350,00 per person. Scouts under 16 will be able to do a Level 2 First Aid qualification and scouts older than 16 will be able to do a Level 3 qualification. These qualifications cover most of the requirements for the badges and is a "fast track" way to get ahead on your advancement. I would consider all scouts who are able to give serious consideration to attending the course.

If you are keen on attending the course, please let me know by 21h00 on Thursday 7 March 2019.
